Homa Hoodfar is Professor of Anthropology, Emeritus, at Concordia University, Montreal. Her primary research and expertise lies in legal and political anthropology. She examines the intersection of political economy; gender and citizenship rights; women's formal and informal politics, gender and public sphere in Muslim contexts. She has extensively field studied on empowerment strategies in those communities marginalised by legal constraints particularly in the area of family law and citizenship in Egypt, Iran, Afghanistan, and in Canada's Muslim

community. Professor Hoodfar has also been actively involved in Women Living Under Muslim Laws (WLUML) Network's Research and Publication division since 1980s.
